The bond between a man and his wife is special. Marriage takes trust, understanding, and even sometimes leaps of faith. There is more than just love involved. There is conviction and devotion to one another that compares to no other relationship.

But it is those leaps of faith that is the true story of one grand southern home in Tennessee. Not once, but twice in the history of the mansion has a wife's faith in her husband resulted in one of the finest homes in the state.

The story of Falcon Rest Mansion and Gardens really has two beginnings. First, the story of the home's development and construction, and later its rebirth to its former glory. For over 120 years the home has been part of Warren County history in more ways than one.

For George and Charlien McGlothin, the house has been a labor of love. The couple have worked together, not only restoring the home, but also furnishing the mansion with period furnishings.

"It was built in 1896 by Clay Faulkner, who was the richest man in this region," George explained. "He promised his wife, Mary, that if she would move two and a half miles from downtown McMinnville, near Faulkner Springs which is named after him, he would build her the grandest mansion in Tennessee. She, like any other woman, said 'If you build it, I'll move.'

And so the history of Falcon Rest was born. Mr. McGlothin said that Faulkner wanted to move so he could be closer to his Mountain City Woolen Mill, which was cattycornered across from the mansion property. "They made Gorilla Pants, which were supposedly so strong a gorilla couldn't pull them apart. They were work pants that were made out of wool. One year later, in 1897, they moved into this 10,000 square foot mansion called Falcon Rest."

Faulkner was a busy man, with several business ventures in the area. "He had a couple of mills," George said. "He had the one across the road, that made the Gorilla Pants, and he had one at Rock Island, which is about 15 minutes from us, the Great Falls Cotton Mill. Whichever way the economy went, he won. He made all the linens during the Spanish American War in the mill at Rock Island."

When Faulkner supervised the construction of the mansion, he went all out. The Victorian mansion featured tasteful elegance and top-notch materials. "The mansion features 20 plus rooms, including six bedrooms, library, parlor, and dining room," Charlien explained. "It's pretty much what you would see at any mansion like Belle Meade."

Curved windows, gingerbread veranda, brickwork detailing, and attic vents gave the house character, while brass door hardware, marble surrounds on the fireplaces, and intricately carved woodwork, showcased the interior.

The home was also ahead of its time in many ways. Elaborate waterworks piped in from a spring provided refrigeration for perishables, fresh water for cooking and bathing, and cooled the home. The house was also lit with electric lights, something surrounding homes didn't see until 30 years later. The house was also warmed by a central steam heating system during winter months.

The house was a prime example of Southern elegance for many years, until Clay Faulkner died in 1916. Just three years later, his wife would sell the home and move to Nashville, taking up residence next door to the governor.

It would be a few years later before Falcon Rest would begin its second important phase in history. "In the 1940s, the mansion was converted into a nursing home, and by the 1950s it was one of the first full-scale hospitals in the county, Charlien said. "They had added on to it, and made a mess of the building, but it was a great hospital that didn't close until 1968."

After that, the future of the building was uncertain. "It sat here for 15 years with nothing being done to it," George said "Some wanted to tear it down, but they couldn't because the walls are solid brick. The hospital had took out the staircase, the mantles, and a lot of the woodwork, but once they realized they couldn't tear it down, they just left stuff."

It was then that the second leap of faith story came into being. "I bought this house in 1989 without my wife ever having seen it," George said with a grin. "I tell men, 'Don't ever do what I did.' We lived in Fayetteville, Tennessee, about 80 miles away. I brought my wife here on Easter Sunday, took her to the worst part and said, 'Well honey, what do you think?' She pointed to the house and said, 'You put a mortgage on my house for this?' Immediately I knew I was in trouble. We went to church, and she repented, and the rest is history."

"That's not true," Charlien said laughingly. "I decided to forgive him."

"We've been doing this 33 years, and we're still restoring," George said. "When we got here, we did 95 percent of the restoration ourselves. In 1997, we won the Great American Home Award, given by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. We were also featured in Bob Vila's American Home Magazine under Best Restorations in America. The Vila



people that came said they had never seen a place this large, this bad of shape, ever brought back to look this nice."

The McGlothin's had reinstalled the staircase, and most of the woodwork was restored, but the furnishings from the Faulkner's days had long been gone. So, George and Charlien also worked diligently to find period accurate furniture to feature throughout the home. "We had an art professor at Vanderbilt that called it a work of art," George said. "He said it was like Faulkner never left and everything is sitting right where he had left it."

Today, Falcon Rest is a tour mansion, where they have escorted guest tours of the mansion and the grounds. There are guest rooms on the grounds, but the bed and breakfast and the mansion are separate. "We do individual tours, and we also do group tours," George said. "We have church groups, school groups, and all kinds of groups coming here, and we do entertainment shows for them."

"We also have a tea room, where we can serve individuals lunch," Mrs. McGlothin added. "If someone wants to come eat here, we have several menu items to choose from. If they want a formal tea, we need 24-hour reservations for that."


The facility also has a 1,200 square foot gift shop where you'll find various unique gift items, and the mansion is available for special events, business retreats, weddings, and parties, along with offering food services.

"We take care of everything," Mrs. McGlothin said. "You know, it's about people. History is about people. That's what we talk about

when people come to the mansion, the interesting stories about the people connected with the mansion. We have fun with the history."

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here's something magical about trains. Almost from the time children learn to walk and talk, they become fascinated with chugging locomotives, freight and passenger cars, and that little red caboose. For many, they never outgrow their love of the tracks, and the steam and diesel behemoths that power their way across the country. For some in Middle Tennessee, that love of the toys of our youths has led rolling history on some very real tracks.

The Tennessee Central Railway Museum has been running excursion trains for over 30 years, along historic tracks from Nashville to the Upper Cumberland. While the museum runs some very real engines along the tracks, the idea for the museum started with a love for model trains.

"We started out as a model railroad group," Randal Brooks with the TCRM said. "We would set up model railroads at different locations around the city ... shopping malls, the State Fair, the Adventure Science Center, and places like that. That was before we got the building. We probably had 75 to 100 people involved that were primarily interested in HO model railroads."

"Around 1989, that's when we were able to get this building and we started doing excursions," Brooks continued. "This building was called the Master Mechanic's Building for the Tennessee Central Railway, and is the only original building left from that railroad."

The Tennessee Central Railway was founded in 1884 as the Nashville and Knoxville Railroad by Alexander S. Crawford. Over the next few years, tracks were laid and lines connected, which were eventually reorganized and renamed to the Tennessee Central Railroad in 1902. By 1922, the name had changed to the Tennessee Central Railway. Through its history, it would eventually extend its lines from Hopkinsville, Kentucky, all the way east to Harriman, Tennessee.

The railroad would run freight and passenger service along its lines for many years, with communities like Brush Creek, Sykes, and Watertown having stops along the lines. A person would be able to board the day train in Brush Creek and travel to Nashville, then take the night train to return home.

The railroad went bankrupt in 1968, and much of the Nashville beltline of tracks were sold to the state to build I-440. Lines west of Nashville were sold to Illinois Central Railroad, while the eastern end of the line, from Harriman to just west of Crossville went to the Southern Railway. The remaining portion of the line, used today by the museum from Crossville to Nashville, was sold to the Louisville & Nashville Railroad.


"Our sign that we have outside, used to be located at the end of Broadway (Nashville) on 1st Avenue where Riverfront Park is now located," Brooks explained. "Back then, there were tracks that went down 1st Avenue, and all that down there was railroad tracks. In the early years, the area was where riverboats would land and cargo would be loaded and unloaded onto trains for transport to other areas."

Today, the museum has grown and host a variety of events. "We run excursions on selected Saturdays," Brooks said. "We usually go from Nashville to Watertown, and Watertown usually has some sort of event going on. It could be their Bluegrass Music Festival, it could be a wine tasting, their Easter egg hunt, and even their yard sale that they have twice a year. We usually leave around 9:00 or 10:00 in the morning, it takes us about two and a half hours to get to Watertown, people get off the train and eat or shop, they stay for two and a half hours, then they board and we head back to Nashville. We also have murder mystery trips, train robbery trips, and North Pole trips in November and December."

Over the years Watertown has embraced the excursion trains and even has some future developments involving the railway, with plans to install a turntable at the depot.

"Our cars were all built during the 1950s," Brooks said. "They came off of different railroads. Some from the Santa Fe Railroad, some from the Pennsylvania Railroad, others from the Northern Pacific Railroad. Our engines were built in the 1950s also."

The museum is also helping with the restoration of a familiar part of Nashville's history. The Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Railway's




4-8-4 locomotive, 576.

"576 was donated to the City of Nashville during the 1950s and put on display in Centennial Park, where it sat for many years," Brooks said. "About three years ago, a group of people called the Nashville Steam Preservation Society made a deal with the city to take the engine and have it restored."

The engine was placed on a special lowboy trailer and moved from the park, eventually ending up at the Tennessee Central's facility, where Nashville Steam is currently working on the restoration. The old engine is being totally disassembled, with special parts being sent off to different locations across the country during its restoration. Once it is back operational, Brooks says the museum hopes it will be a part of their excursions. Donations towards the restoration can be made at www. nashvillesteam.org.

Brooks said that the museum facility in Nashville offers a display of their model railroads, as well as a hobby shop, though part of the building is still under repair from damage during last year's tornados that struck Nashville. With the damage, Brooks said that the non-profit museum welcomes donations to help with repairs and operations.
